A Child's Heart – Serving with Gladness

t was a busy Sunday morning at church. Nearing the last verse of the hymn, Michael's willingness struck me so clearly. It was evident that when our Music Minister asked him to pray the offertory prayer, he did not hesitate. There were no excuses, and he didn't question what God was calling him to do.

His prayer was that of an innocent child, asking God to bless the offering. A prayer straight from the heart of a child is an eye-opening experience. But more than the innocence was his willingness to serve.

I often think about this event. This should be a lesson to all Christians who are asked to serve. Why are we so reluctant to say yes when approached to serve on a committee, or participate in a program? Maybe we need to look at the innocence of a child's heart. Isn't this what Jesus would do. When the Father spoke to Jesus, He didn't turn down a chance to serve. In fact, he served all mankind and gave his life for us so that we could have eternal life.
